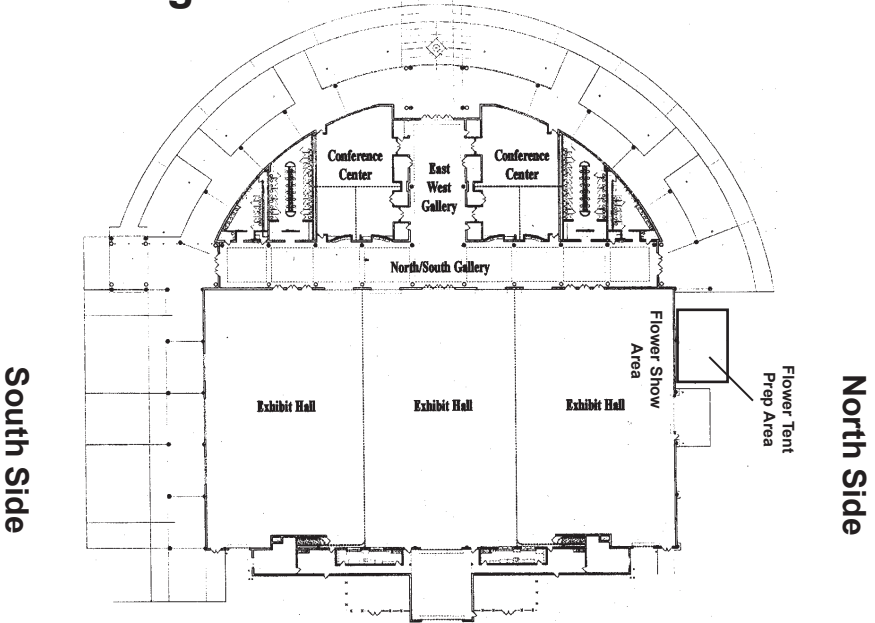

ELIGIBILITY

1. **All exhibitors are required to read and abide by the Georgia National Fair General Rules and Regulations.**
2. All flower shows in this department are open to any amateur gardener in the state of Georgia. No entry fee is required. Please check each show for rules pertaining to that show.
3. Youth Horticulture entries **MUST STATE EXHIBITOR'S SCHOOL ON ENTRY CARD.** Any entry without this information will be judged with adult entries.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

4. Exhibitors must complete an official entry form of the Georgia National Fair to be eligible for cash awards.
5. Special Exhibits and Design Classes of the Standard Flower Show are open to any amateur designer, **but must be registered with the entries chairman.**
6. **PREREGISTRATION IN ALL SECTIONS IS ADVISED.**
7. Only one entry per class, per exhibitor, except where class is subdivided according to color, variety, or kind. Duplicate entry tags will be disqualified.
8. Two or more persons may not exhibit the same variety from the same garden. **Gardens located at the same address are considered the same garden.**
9. Exhibits must be checked by Classification Committee for each show to receive an entry tag. Both entry form and tag must be properly completed by the exhibitor and tag must be attached to exhibit prior to being placed in the show. The decision of the Classification Committee is final. **Exhibitors bringing more than 15 specimens must obtain entry tags in advance and should arrive two hours prior to close of entries for that show.**
10. Exhibits must have been grown by exhibitor or have been in the possession

of the exhibitor for at least three months and be named by common and botanical names (if possible) on the entry tag. Named varieties will be given precedence over unnamed ones. Plants that are staged on a table for the protection of the plant may be elevated with a clay pot not to exceed 15”.

11. **REMOVAL** - No exhibit or part of an exhibit shall be removed at any time during the Fair except by authorized personnel at designated times. Any violation of release time will cause forfeiture of all premiums earned by exhibitor.

12. While the Georgia National Fair and participating flower societies will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, they cannot assume responsibility for injury or loss. Valuables used in exhibits should be insured by the exhibitor.

13. The management reserves the right to reject any exhibit which does not meet its standards for exhibition and the Superintendent shall have the right to remove or exclude from the show at any time any exhibit, or part thereof, which is below the standards of good showmanship.

AWARDS AND PREMIUMS

14. Georgia National Fair ribbons and cash prizes may be awarded in each Class or variety where noted and a Georgia National Fair Rosette may be awarded in Sections where noted. Cash awards (premium checks) will be mailed within six weeks after the Fair is over.

15. Georgia National Sweepstakes Plaque will be awarded to the winner of the most blue ribbons in Horticulture, Division 600.

16. Consult schedules of each show for special awards offered by participating societies and organizations.

All divisions of the Standard Flower Show will be located in the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building on the Georgia National Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must use the NORTH or WEST Gates and follow the Flower Signs to the designated area at the Muller-Murphy-Howard Building. Volunteers with carts will be available to assist.

GENERAL RULES

All exhibitors are required to read and abide by the General Rules and Regulations at the beginning of the premium book and the Horticulture Department Rules as set forth by the Georgia National Fair.

All divisions of the Standard Flower Show will be located in the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building on the Georgia National Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must use the NORTH or WEST Gates and follow the Flower Signs to the designated area at the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building. Volunteers with carts will be available to assist them.

1. This schedule is written to conform to all rules and regulations of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. and The Garden Club of Georgia, Inc. The HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS, revised 2007 edition (hereafter referred to as HB), as amended in THE NATIONAL GARDENER, shall be the authority in all points not covered in this schedule.

2. The purposes of a Standard Flower Show are:

>To educate club members and the viewing public.

>To stimulate interest in horticulture and floral design.

>To provide an outlet for creative expression.

>To convey to the community the objectives of National Garden Clubs, Inc.

3. Any Amateur gardener may enter in the Horticulture Division, and is encouraged to do so. All horticulture entries must have the correct botanical name. Design entries are open to exhibitors who have studied and understand The National Garden Clubs, Inc. Principles and Elements of Design, and who are familiar with Design Division Policies. The Educational Section of the Special Exhibits Division is open to exhibitors who are familiar with the Requirements

and Considerations for all Educational Exhibits. The Youth Section of the Special Exhibits Division is open to any youth ages 4-18. Special Exhibits must be registered in advance with the respective chairmen.

4. The National Garden Clubs, Inc. Standard System of Awarding shall be used in each class or sub-class. Only one first place (blue) ribbon (must score 90 or more), only one second place (red) ribbon (must score 85 or more), only one third place (yellow) ribbon (must score 80 or more), and one or more honorable mention (white) ribbons (must score 75 or more) may be placed at the discretion of the Judges.

5. All exhibits will be accepted Thursday, October 6 from 3:00 P.M. until 7:00 P.M. and on Friday, October 7 from 7:30 A.M. until 9:00 A.M. NO EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER 9:00 A.M ON FRIDAY, OCTOBER 7. Judging shall begin at 10:00 A.M. on Friday, October 7. No entries may be removed before 5:00 P.M. on Sunday, October 9. All exhibits must be removed no later than 7:00 P.M. on Sunday, October 9.

6. Exhibition areas will be vacated by all nonessential people during judging. Only the following persons will be present: General Show Chairman; Horticulture Classification chairman, Design Consultants, Judges, and Clerks.

7. Exhibitors who wish to receive Georgia National Fair cash prizes must fill out the Georgia Living General Entry form (including last four digits of social security number) and give to the Fair Classification Committee at check-in time.

8. Decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.

9. The use of any part of plants on the Georgia Conservation List is strictly prohibited. Other native plants may be exhibited in Horticulture Division, if they are grown by exhibitor and labeled with the correct botanical and common names. Other native plant material may be exhibited in Design Division and Special Exhibits Division, if they are grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and labeled with correct botanical and common name. The State Conservation List is located at the end of the schedule, (<http://www.georgianationalfair.com/>).

10. EMPHASIS MUST BE ON FRESH PLANT MATERIAL. NO ARTIFICIAL PLANT MATERIAL MAY BE USED IN ANY DIVISION OF THIS SHOW

11. The official American and other national flags are not permitted to be used within designs in the Standard Flower Show. In addition to the design itself, use of an official national flag as an underlay, background, skirting, or draping is prohibited.

12. All personal property should be clearly labeled. The Show Committee will exercise the utmost care to protect personal property including container grown plants. They are not responsible for any loss or damage.

13. All entries in Division 600, Horticulture, MUST be checked by the Classification Committee, who shall have the authority to disqualify any entries not conforming, to the schedule and/or not of flower show quality. All entries in Division 601, Design, and Division 602, Special Exhibits, MUST be checked by the Section Consultants, who shall have the authority to disqualify any entries not conforming to the schedule and/or not of flower show quality.

14. In addition to signing all blue ribbon entry cards, an Accredited Judge must sign, date and indicate 90+ on the entry card of exhibits scoring 90 or above. Judges will leave written comments on exhibits in Division I, Design; Division III, Special Exhibits, A-Educational: B-Youth.

15. Each exhibit in competition for ribbons and Top Awards must be the work of one individual. A design and/or educational exhibit previously exhibited and point scored by the NGC Standard System of Awarding in another Standard Flower Show Plant Society Flower Show, Flower Show Judges' Symposium, Flower Show Judges Club, Flower Show Judges' Study Group and Flower Show School may not be exhibited in this show.

16. The Flower Show opens to the public on Friday, October 7, at 1:00 P. M.

17. NO CUT FRUITS AND/OR VEGETABLES ARE ALLOWED IN ANY DIVISION OF THIS STANDARD FLOWER SHOW.

18. The Schedule is the LAW OF THE SHOW.

AWARDS

All exhibits are judged by the National Garden Club (NGC) Standard System of Awarding (Handbook, p. 4 F3b) - 100 point system. The judges' decisions are final.

- *One Blue Ribbon – First Place.....90+
- *One Red Ribbon – Second Place85+
- *One Yellow Ribbon – Third Place.....80+
- *One or more White Ribbons – Honorable Mention....75+

A total of seven Youth Top Awards may be awarded in the Youth Section (HB p.51 & 227 #3-a-1, #3-b-1). three in Design, three in Horticulture, and one in Educational.

Division 600 - Horticulture Rules

1. The Horticulture Division is open to any amateur gardener. Please read General Rules of this schedule which govern this competition.
2. Entries will be accepted from 3:00 P.M. until 7:00 P.M. on Thursday, October 6th and from 7:30 A.M. until 9:00 A.M. on October 7th in the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building. Exhibits may be brought through the North or West gates; follow the flower signs to the designated area at the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building. There will be some parking available in front of the building for unloading. Volunteers with carts will be available to assist. Exhibit release begins at 5:00 P.M. (not before), and ends at 7:00 P.M. on Sunday, October 9th. The Show Committee will not be responsible for property left after that time.
3. Exhibitors are limited to a maximum of 50 entries in Division 600, Horticulture, which includes cut, container grown, and fruit/vegetable specimens. Exhibitors bringing more than 15 total specimens must obtain entry tags in advance and should arrive prior to 8:00 A.M. on October 7th.
4. Entry tags must accompany each exhibit. Each entry tag/card (both portions) must be completely filled out by the exhibitor with water-proof ink, labels or by pencil before being passed by the Classification Committee. Entry tags may be obtained from the Horticulture Entries Chairman. Exhibitors risk forfeiture of prize money if both portions of tag and GNF entry form are not completely filled out. All exhibitors are encouraged to secure entry tags/cards from the Entries Chairman well in advance of the show date.
5. An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any one class or subclass provided each exhibit is of a different cultivar, color, or type, unless otherwise specified in a particular class. The entries must be clean, well groomed and of show quality.
6. All specimens, whether cut, container grown, or collections, MUST be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor. Container grown plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for not less than 90 days. Exception: multiple plantings must have been grown together by the exhibitor for a minimum of six weeks.
7. All entries must have been checked by the Classification Committee. The committee may re-label any incorrectly labeled entry and disqualify any specimen that is not of show quality.
8. Exhibiting plants that are on the State Conservation List will be prohibited. A list of protected species is available at www.georgianationalfair.com or by calling 478-988-6555. Native plants other than those on the State List can be exhibited.
9. Each horticulture specimen must be identified with its binomial name or its currently accepted scientific identification, variety or cultivar when possible. The common name may be added. Only those specimens so named will be eligible for NGC National Top Awards.
10. The Classification Committee has the authority to subdivide classes (as necessary) according to variety cultivar, type, color or container size.
11. Cut horticulture specimens will be exhibited in clear glass bottles furnished by the committee. The larger specimens will be exhibited in exhibitor's containers.
12. Plant material may not be altered by the application (treatment) of oil, commercial "shine" product, dye, etc., that may artificially change the natural color or texture. No wiring is allowed for single specimens.
13. Cut specimens should not have any foliage below the water line (exception- Gladiolus, at least two leaves; Rosa,

roses, thorns).

14. Arboreal specimens can be no longer than 30" from the tip of the specimen to the cut end. Each cut branch must be at least 12" long, include several nodes and have an apical tip.

15. Containers for container-grown plants may not exceed 14" in any dimension and should be in proportion to the plant size.

16. Cut specimens of Hedera helix (English Ivy) and vines should be no longer than 24" and must have an apical tip or new growth.

17. Double potting is permitted; however, inner pot must not be visible.

18. Cut horticulture specimens may be wedged with a small piece of green Styrofoam or celery furnished by the exhibitor.

19. Only members of the Horticulture Placement Committee are eligible to place entries (except Collections and Displays must be placed by the exhibitor in the space reserved for the

exhibit).

20. Reservations for exhibiting Collections and Displays must be made in advance with the Staging Chairman, Sibyl McGlaun (229-878-2574) or with the Show Chairman, Virginia Pennington, 229-387-0537. Reservations must be made by October 4th, in order to assure a 22 inches wide by 30-inches deep space for each exhibit.

21. Judges are eligible to enter in Horticulture Division, except the those Sections that they are judging.

22. Judges are requested to review the red, yellow, and white winning exhibits to determine if any of them scored 90 or more and to so indicate on the entry card. An Accredited Judge is requested to sign and date all blue and 90+ entry cards and Top Award Ribbons.

23. Scale of points, please refer to the "Handbook for Flower Shows", 2007 Edition, p 297-302, and to The National Gardener, Summer 2010 Edition or NGC Website.

Division 601 - Design Rules

Exhibitors use the NORTH or WEST Gates. Follow designated Flower Show Signs to the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building to unload.

1. All entries in the Design Division must be registered with the Entries Chairman no later 9:00 A.M. on Friday, October 7.
2. After a reservation is accepted, if that individual is unable to exhibit, he/she must obtain a substitute and inform the entries chairman prior to the show.
3. There will be four (4) entries in each class in Division 601.
4. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each class and may enter more than one class.
5. Each design must be the work of one exhibitor and may not come from previous flower shows.
6. Exhibitors should place a 3 X 5-inch card with each exhibit listing all plant material used in design.
7. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit.
8. A single flower or a container-grown plant is not a "design".
9. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruits or vegetables are permitted in the Design Division, or any other division of a Standard Flower Show. Artificial is "imitation" or "copy", hand-crafted, manufactured to represent and/or appear as real., such as: silk, plastic, singing or speaking, motorized or metallic flora.
10. Manufactured items having a basic utilitarian use other than to simulate plant material are permitted. Acceptable examples are: dinnerware, cabbage-shaped soup tureen, apple-shaped plate, or floral motif napkin rings, etc.
11. Products manufactured from plant material whose natural state as plant

material has been so altered as to be given new identity and a specific name, is permitted. Examples: paper, lumber, bowl, basket, pedestal, frame, base, etc.

12. Plant material that has been treated to alter its exterior appearance may be used only in its dried state; fresh plant material may never be treated.
13. Religious symbols used in design must be displayed in a respectful and non offensive manner. American and other national flags may not be incorporated into a design.
14. All living members and taxidermal representations of the Animal Kingdom are disallowed in competitive designs.
15. The following are permitted in all design classes unless prohibited by the schedule, or specific requirements of a Design Top Exhibitor Award.
 - a. Accessory and featured objects.
 - b. Clipped, stripped, bent or otherwise manipulated fresh plant material.
 - c. Contrived flowers or other forms made from real plant materials, fresh and/or dried.
 - d. Objects which add interest when tastefully used, e.g., feathers, antlers, coral, horns, starfish, sponges, sea fans, shells, nests, manufactured or crafted simulations of birds, animals, etc. for toys or as decorative items are permitted.
 - e. Special lighting requiring electrical sources.
 - f. All staging properties, such as panels, frames, pedestals, columns, boxes, cubes, etc. may be incorporated into designs. The Schedule may not prescribe their precise use if eligible for Designer's Choice Award.
 - g. Container-grown plants growing in soil, as part of a Still Life,

Pot-et-Fleur, Vignette and Exhibition Table Type II classes, etc., where appropriate.

h. Living plants with roots attached, e.g. moss, Bromeliaceae.

i. Plants on state conservation/ native plant list, grown by exhibitor or obtained in legal manner and so identified. State policy prevails.

16 Exhibits must be approved by the Design Entries Chairman or Consultant for each section before the exhibitor leaves.

17. Designs may be entered from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 6 and from 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. on Friday October 7 Judging will begin at 10:00 a.m.
